Case Study of the Month

Name of Student- Abdul Khan

Age- 5 years

Disability- Autism Spectrum Disorder

Area of Development - Cognitive Skills - Shapes and Colors Recognition

Goal of the Month- He will be able to identify basic colour and shapes with different types of material with verbal and physical promoting.

Material: Shape peg board, shapes and colour flashcards, and 3D objects.

Beginning of the month: - He was doing a palmer grip peg board activity with verbal prompting.

Sessions: - He identifies and matches colours and shapes with maximum help.

End of the month: - Now he can identify and match colours and shapes with a flash card to objects and do shapes peg board activity with minimum verbal help.

Case Study of the Month

Name of the Student: - Ayush Ghogle.

Disability: - Intellectual Disability

Age of the child: - 7 years

Area of development: - Pre literacy (HWT)

Goal of the Month: - At the end of the month Ayush will identify vertical & horizontal alphabets & will make alphabets with big lines & little lines.

Material: Mat, big line, little line, tray, ice cream stick, whiteboard, marker.

Beginning of the month: - Ayush was putting big & little lines everywhere.

Sessions: In the session first he understands which line is little & which is big. Then the teacher gave him shapes to make. Then we made the same. Also, the teacher made lines on white board & put ice cream sticks on those lines.

End of the month: - Now Ayush matches the big & little lines with big & little lines. Also, start making L, F, E, T, I, etc. alphabets with teachers' verbal prompts & copy.

Vision Therapy

Name of the child: Ayansh Dawre

Disability: Cerebral Palsy with Visual Impairment

Area of Concern: Poor ocular motor skills

Field loss: Right field loss

Goal: visual Discrimination

When Ayansh came for assessment:	With regular vision Therapy Ayansh is now
 He was not able to discriminate between objects. During activities, he was unable to use his hands. Latent responses were observed. Attention was lacking. Parental Guidance: Mother has taught at home to show contrast cards and Discrimination activities using available material at home.

Occupational Therapy

Name of the child: Rudra Bansode

Disability: Autism Spectrum Disorder with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder

Area of Concern: Attention span and Sitting Tolerance

Goal: Attention span and sitting tolerance up to 10 mins

When Rudra came for assessment:	With regular Occupational Therapy Rudra can now:

Parental Guidance:

Keshavi's mother has been taught different strategies to develop oral movements and Oro-motor exercises. The mother diligently implements these strategies at home, contributing to Keshavi's progress.

Physiotherapy

Name of the child: Nishka Dhotre

Disability: Spastic Hemiplegic (left)

Area of Concern: left upper limb, left lower limb strength.

Goal: lower limb coordination, use of left side limb, decrease tightness, increase range of motion in left leg.

When Nishka came for assessment:	With regular Physical Therapy Nishka can now:
 Gait abnormality was noted. She was not able to jump. She was not able to use her left hand properly. An increase in tightness was observed. 	 Gait abnormality has significantly reduced. She is now able to jump. She can use her left hand properly. Tightness has decreased.

Parental Guidance:

Home program was implemented, focusing on posture awareness, positioning, proper diet, and a strengthening program.
