Dr. Dipti provided invaluable insights, clarifying our presentations and offering suggestions for future improvements. Other teachers also shared constructive feedback and strategies to help us navigate challenges effectively.

Notably, Dr. Dipti commended our commendable efforts, such as securing confirmation for next year's enrollment with fees and establishing the toy library. Each center thoroughly discussed its reviews, identified learning points, implemented new practices, and set ambitious upcoming term. This collaborative goals for the environment fostered increased socialization among the centers, facilitating the exchange of ideas and promoting collective learning. Handwriting Without Tears

On April 19th, 2024, the Muskan Foundation organized an internal training session on Handwriting Without Tears (HWT). Ms. Shibani Panda, having completed an entire book on HWT, led the session by revising the set of letters that children can write easily and remember through a playful approach. Following the revision, Ms. Panda engaged the teachers by posing questions, to which all actively participated and provided answers. The HWT session proved to be both informative and captivating, characterized by its interactive nature.





Buddy Training

On April 23rd and 24th, 2024, the Muskan Foundation organized buddy training for all six centers, each presenting on various topics. The topics covered were exceptionally interesting and informative. Following the presentations, attendees gained a clearer and deeper understanding of disabilities.

On the first day, Bandra Center presented students with DB and Multiple Impairments, elucidating the distinctions between impairment, disability, and handicap, as well as different syndromes. Hume Center covered the topic of Sample Assessment, providing insights into different assessment methods. Goregaon Team 1 discussed Transition/Visual & Multiple Impairment, focusing on the transition of MDVI students to appropriate programs. Wadia Team presented on Infants and Mother Toddlers (Visual & Multiple Impairment), covering screening, assessment, communication techniques, ECI, IEP & IFSPs, strategies for MDVI children, and demonstrations of brain gym exercises for mother-toddler pairs.





On the second day, Panvel Center presented on Comprehensive Individual Assessment, expanding knowledge on different assessment methods. Kalyan's Team covered Orientation and Mobility for children with multiple impairments, detailing orientation and mobility techniques. Goregaon's Second Team presented on Biobehavioral State Management for students with Profound Impairments, focusing on strategies for managing biobehavioral states. All topics were both engaging and informative, contributing to the overall success of the buddy training.

Behaviour Modification training

On April 27th, 2024, the Muskan Foundation organized a training session on Behavior Modification, facilitated by Mrs. Praful Sudarshan. Before the session, teachers were asked to submit their questions regarding concerns they had about their students' behavior. Mrs. Praful Sudarshan addressed these questions, providing numerous interesting strategies and suggestions to help overcome behavioral challenges. Additionally, she provided a case study for discussion among the teachers, further enhancing the learning experience. The session proved to be both informative and interactive, fostering meaningful dialogue and learning opportunities for all participants.

Disability:- Autism Spectrum Disorder

Material - Colorful objects like building blocks, beads, and color flashcards.

Area: Cognition (Color - Yellow)

Goal of Month:- He will be able to discriminate and identify the color yellow with verbal and physical prompts.

Before working on Him- He was able to sort colors and engage in coloring activities with verbal assistance.

After working on Him- He can now identify and discriminate the color yellow among objects. He can also differentiate it from other colors with verbal and physical prompts.

Disability: Global Developmental Delay (GDD) with Visual Impairment (VI)

Area of Concern: Poor Depth Perception

Goal: Visual Discrimination Field Loss

- Encourage supported sitting on an inclined surface for eating or hand activities
- Utilize textures over hands and legs as instructed during individual counseling sessions
- Encourage Renuka to maintain the all-fours position for 10 counts with support thrice a day
- Provide variously sized and shaped objects for Renuka to hold and command her to release them
